The Old Testament - Exodus

Exodus is the second book of the bible and means 'a departure' or - to use a current expression - an 'exiting' of the people of Israel from Eqvpt. The book has 4 main parts:

- 1. The freeing of the Israelites from Egypt
- 2. Their journey to mount Sinai
- 3. God's covenant with them, giving them moral, civil and religious laws
- 4. The building and furnishing of places of worship e.g. the ark, and laws relating to priests and worship of God.

Firstly who were these people? At the beginning of Exodus we are told that they were the descendants of the 11 sons of Jacob (who was the grandson of Abraham) and who came with Jacob to join Joseph, who was already there. The name Israelites comes from a description given to Jacob meaning 'he who wrestled with God':

'the man (God) said your name will no longer be Jacob for you have wrestled with God and with men and as you have won, so your name will be Israel' Genesis 32. 28

Initially 70 people directly descended from Jacob came to Egypt from Canaan. In the course of time Joseph and his brothers died, but their descendants, the Israelites, prospered and multiplied. The new king who knew nothing about Joseph, was concerned about the Israelites as a threat:

'in case of war they might join our enemies to fight against usso we must find a way to stop them being more numerous by putting them as slaves to crush their spirits with hard labour' Exodus 1.10,11

1. Moses and his brother Aaron both confronted the Egyptian King (see 5.1 to 11.10) The King eventually, after many warnings, allowed them to leave the country (12.1 to 15.21). An important event to facilitate this was the Passover: Moses instructed the Israelites to kill a sheep or goat and smear its blood on their door posts so that the Lord, going through the country to kill the Egyptians, will 'passover' their houses without killing the occupants. (12.21-36) This has implications in our Agnus Dei or Lamb of God, which is a prayer said in our Holy Communion service. It is also worth noting that the New Testament accounts of the Last Supper are intended to reflect this meal as a memorial to Passover i.e. a meal of unleavened bread. (Matthew 26.17-19; Mark 14.12-16 and Luke 22.7-13)

2. The Israelites successfully crossed the Red Sea, where the pursuing Egyptian Army was destroyed. They experienced considerable sufferings and hardship but eventually entered the Sinai desert (Exodus 19)

3. It was at Mount Sinai that Moses received from God the10 commandments detailed in chapter 20. These commandments are often featured on the



east wall of our churches, and are an optionally quoted for the start of the Holy Communion service Order One and the Book of Common Prayer. In chapter 24 the covenant (the promise) is sealed giving the laws and festivals by which the people of Israel are to celebrate, follow and live-by.



4. The covenant tent - the tent of the Lord's presence - contains the two stone tablets inscribed with the commandments given to Moses. Elaborate details of construction of these and their contents appear in subsequent chapters. Exodus concludes with an account of the tabernacle, which is of special importance, affirming the relevance of worship in the life of Israel.

The central figure of Exodus is Moses, who became a symbol of God's presence and authority among His people. He is seen by the New Testament writers as a type of Jesus Christ. Exodus also warns of people's tendency to rebel against God with the example of the golden calf (Exodus 32). Aaron also plays a major role, being portrayed as a model priest for the Israeli nation.

In conclusion, a major theme of this book and relevant to Christians today, I would say, is that the people of God are to be distinct and set apart, although of course being in the everyday life of the world, in the way they worship and conduct themselves.

Christian Aid Week 13 to 19 May 2018

Christian Aid is an agency of the churches in Britain and Ireland with Archbishop Rowan Williams as chair of the Board of Trustees. It works globally for profound change so that all can live free from poverty. Christian Aid works with 475 partners in 37 countries, funding emergency aid

and humanitarian work such as help for Nepal following the 2015 earthquake, floods in the Philippines, famine in East Africa, food crises in Nigeria and Malawi and the worsening situation in South Sudan. Also Christian Aid funds the training of people to deal with the effects of climate change and preparing them for the threat of natural disasters - as well as working on HIV, training and education, health, sanitation and peace and reconciliation.

For the year 2016/17 its total income was £97million 10 % less than last year and expenditure of £93.6 million of which 15% was spent on fund raising and only 1% on governance. Its main sources of income other than from institutional bodies etc. is received from Christian Aid week amounting last year to £10.4 million and from emergency appeals of £7.4 million in the year to 31 March 2017.

Jesus could see that they still weren't convinced, so he asked them, "Do you have anything to eat?" They gave him a piece of fish and he ate it as they watched.



This year, the Centenary of the signing of the 11 November 1918 Armistice, we will specially be honouring the generation of soldiers, families and citizens of the world





Nature Notes by Bluebell – April – May 2018



The snow storm, blizzards and freezing winds of early March, "coming in like a lion," swept in large flocks of fieldfares and lapwings, but they have gone, and as soon as the sun shone, a little skylark rose into the air singing above the grassy field, where jack

snipe scattered with funny little bleats before Bluebell's feet. Two pairs of ravens are sweeping through the blue sky above Bluebell, making their distinctive "cronk" call. They are huge birds, with a wingspan of up to a metre and a half, and a body length of nearly a metre from beak to tip of diamond-shaped tail. They fly together and tumble and play as a pair bonding display, for they mate for life, and show devotion and affection to each other.

When leaves cover the trees, when the swallow comes, and the chiff chaff is heard, then colour will flood over the grey land again, yellow and gold with celandines, golden gorse in flower on moors and sea cliffs,

primroses, daffodils, and catkins, green grass, and blue sky, blue eggs of black bird and song thrush. Brilliant blue feather in the wing of jay. The smaller crows, jackdaw and jay, are about in spring sun, poking around for nest places.



Yellow brimstone, the first butterfly, and ladybirds are waking. Easter. Already early lambs are in the fields.

For nearly fifty years, every spring time, every Eastertide, Bluebell has returned to The General Prologue to the Canterbury Tales by Geoffrey Chaucer (ca. 1343 -1400). All the hope and joyfulness and excitement and restless new life of English Spring, God's Easter gift of life after darkness, winter and death, is there in this lovely poem:

Whan that Aprill with his showers soote The droght of March hath pierced to the roote, And bathed every veyne in swich licour *such; liquid*

Of which vertu engendred is the flower ; When Zephirus eek with his sweete breeth Inspired hath in every holt and heeth and heathland

The tendre croppes, and the yonge sonne Hath in the Ram his halve cours yronne, *course*

And smale foweles maken melodye, That slepen al the nyght with open ye

(So priketh hem nature in hir corages):

Thanne longen folk to goon on pilgimages,

And palmeres for to seken straunge strondes, shores

GARDEN NOTES BY DOUG



Doug's dad was a fan of Gladioli. All those bright colours on long stems with the sword-like leaves. They have been somewhat out of fashion for the past 40 years much like some of the furniture of the late 1950's. All that pale minimalist wood, swirly patterns, the sideboard on long thin legs, the orange and brown walls. Now it

seems much of this is coming back (and some even want to preserve the centre of Plymouth for future generations to admire). So, Gadiloli are back 'in', though I suspect with rather different planting styles to my dad's. He grew groups of plants together in a bed, not mixed up like the borders of today. More a municipal style of planting. A block of colour here and another one there. No drifts of interwoven colour, texture and height. Perhaps it's time for me to get some? They do look good in a vase, just like the roses he grew. 'Peace' was one of his favourite roses, I remember. But, I promise not to throw Galdioli around like Dame Edna Everage, an entertaining act of horticultural disrespect if ever there was one.

And, talking of horticultural disrespect, my wallflowers have gone! A great loss. Stripped of their tops down to an inch from the soil (that's 2.54cm for the youngsters among you). Done with lightning speed. Not by snails (they're still asleep) but by sheep! Somehow they got into the garden. They ignored the daffodils, the hellebores, the solitary artichoke and even some of the grass but they loved the wallflowers. It's perhaps as well that it wasn't later in the year, then they could have had a feast. Highly intelligent, they know a good canape when they see one. And, where was our sheep-cat when this happened? Asleep!

No matter what the weather, it's always the wrong kind. I would have sown more seed, both flowers and vegetables, earlier in March but I'm glad now that I didn't. I'm waiting until this frosty stuff has gone. Read 'late March' for 'early'. Still time for the beetroot, French beans, runner beans, calendulas, nicotianas, peas, carrots and many others. Happy sowings!

Current BT Scam - a bad experience

I and others in the community have been pestered by calls purporting to be from BT. claiming that our internet is slow and they can assist. They will try to get your router number and offer to take over your computer to fix the problem. Don't do this!!

Their aim, of course, is to hack your machine, steal bank details and generally fleece you of your money. They are polite and very convincing, but don't fall for it. They rely on our unwillingness to be rude, but they are thieves.

You are in control: just put the 'phone down and cut them off

They were so persistent that I eventually contacted BT to see if they were working on internet connections in our area. They were not, and BT blocked the calls for me. If you do have technical problems, call your provider yourself. Fd.
