# The Psalms otherwise known as the Psalter or the Psalmody by lan Silcox

The 150 individual psalms are both the hymn and prayer book of the bible composed by different authors over a long period of time. They were used by the people of



Israel in their worship eventually being included in their scriptures and hence the Old Testament. They are also an integral part of our Common Worship and Book of Common Praver worship and liturgy. The psalms are basically grouped together into five sections each of which closes with words of praise for example psalm 72 'Praise be to His glorious name for ever; may the whole earth be filled with His glory Amen, Amen ' Collections of psalms were being composed in King David's time and perhaps earlier; but they had many authors with 73 of the psalms linked to traditional titles to King David 'e.g. 21 verse 1 'the king shall rejoice in your strength O Lord, how greatly shall he rejoice in your salvation' as well as being relevant to particular episodes in his life e.g. psalm 51 verses 2 - 4 'Wash me thoroughly from my wickedness and cleanse me from my sin. For I acknowledge my faults and my sin is ever before me. Against you only have I sinned and done what is evil in your sight' - see also the canticle no.6 A Song of Penitence in Common Worship daily prayers. However, the part of the process of composition of the psalms went on for much of Israel's history coming it seems at a peak when the Jews returned home from their Babylon exile and rebuilt the Jerusalem temple.

Everyone, I'm sure, has a favourite psalm; among the most widely known are :- 19/. The heaven declare glory of God 23/. The Lord is my shepherd 46/. God is our refuge and strength 95/. Come let us praise the Lord 103/. Bless the Lord O my soul 121/. I lift my eyes to the hills *-a particular favourite of mine* and 139/. Lord you have searched me and you know me. The range however is considerable from the utmost joy to the deepest sorrow, but all with the message that in every area of our lives God is present. The psalms present a realism about human experience emphasised by an unmistakable faith in God's love for mankind and His creation.

In our book of daily prayers –the red books available for morning and evening prayer St. Eustachius church by door to the vestry – each of the psalms has an opening and closing refrain and closing prayer so even if you do not have time to read the whole psalm I feel a short prayer/mediation on these would be helpful to supplement your prayer life.

After such a long and wonderfully hot summer (*especially the Lamerton Tractor Day*), there's a real feeling of 'back to school' now as I sit down to write this letter. We are only two weeks into the start of a new term and although the end of the year is not yet in sight, there is an exciting sense of new beginnings at this time of year that we maybe don't feel to the same degree in January.

Going way back in history, Michaelmas, originally the 11<sup>th</sup> of October and now fixed in the calendar on September 29th, was the beginning and end of the farmer's year. Harvest was over, the Reeve of the Manor would make out the accounts for the year and Michaelmas hiring fairs were held to organise the work force for the months ahead. Of course, those of you fortunate enough to have attended one of the country's long-established universities, will be aware that Michaelmas is also the name of the first term of the academic year.


But the name comes from a Christian festival, the Feast of Saint Michael and All Angels, celebrating the Archangel Michael. He was one of the principal angelic warriors, who was said to be a protector against the dark of the night. What darkness, do you suppose? The long winter nights ahead, the hard days scraping a living from the soil perhaps. Or maybe, in modern times, a friend to help us battle through settling into new surroundings, learning new things and facing new challenges? Or perhaps, fighting against the very real and serious forces that seem to lead humanity to the inhumanity of war and injustice?

Folklore in the British Isles rather comically suggests that Michaelmas Day is the last day for picking blackberries. This was based on the story that when Saint Michael expelled Lucifer from Heaven, the devil fell into a thorny blackberry bush and cursed the fruit with his fiery breath, making them unfit to eat. So it was considered bad luck to eat the berries after this day and country folk made a Michaelmas pie with the last of the season's fruit.

Now as my waistline will attest to, I think I've had more than my fair share of blackberry and apple pies over time, so I'll welcome a ban on these delicious desserts. But I'll continue to think about how the Church's traditions (however strange some of them may be!) continue to provide a framework for modern life and feel emboldened by the thought that we are not alone - God and his servants, Saint Michael and his fellow angels, are there, helping us to fight for peace and justice in this ever challenging world.



her and cared for her. She had faith that if she asked him to help her, he would.


How much faith is enough? Do we need to have a lot of faith, or will just a little bit do? The answer may surprise you.


The followers of Jesus said to him one day, "Give us more faith."

When we have faith in God, it isn't a question of how big our faith is, it is a question of how powerful our God is, and with God all things are possible!


Father, we don't ask you to give us more faith. We simply ask that you help us to use the faith that we have and trust you to do the rest. In Jesus' name we pray. Amen.



Well, what a summer? One day clear skies and hot sunshine, another grey with torrential rain. Many plants (and the slugs and snails) have coped well and apples, plums, raspberries and gooseberries have too thanks to bees and other pollinators.

Planting flowers especially for pollinators has become something of a fashion, but bees have been prized in the garden since the Ancient Egyptians. Even in the 17<sup>th</sup> Century bees were considered ideal role models – industrious, clean, and well organised with a solid social hierarchy - the Queen, her Workers and the Drones (don't even think about Parliament or Brexit!).

It was long thought that bees reproduced asexually. They were believed to spring to life spontaneously in rotting meat and having done so, lived chastely together like angels, free from sin! Only later did the functions and roles of the workers, drones and queen become properly understood. The *birds and the bees*, the *honeymoon*, the *bees knees*, the *hive of activity*... a long list of sayings are established in language.

Show-time has been and gone but the challenge is ever present. Oh, to get a 'First' for that bunch of flowers or set of courgettes. Next year could see it happen? Maybe? Shows have been a big thing for hundreds of years. In the 1820's it was reported there was a florist's society in almost every town and village. Well, up North, anyway. The Horticultural Magazine of 1847 tells of a florist who, rather than see his flowers spoiled by frost, gave up the blankets from his bed, and subsequently died of a chill.

My garlic has done well this year. Every clove produced a plump delicious bulb. The variety (and, there are many to choose from) was 'Solent Wight' but a different variety the year before was a dismal failure.

Dahlias and Ageratums looking good together in a vase – see the photo. The Ageratums (try Ageratum Houstonianum 'Timeless') are easy to grow from seed in spring and need very little ongoing care; producing loads of flowers to cut for the house in late summer and autumn.

If you've got a perennial which has got too big for its trousers dig it up, chop it in two, replant one half and pop the other in the neighbour's porch.

#### FARMING LIFE BY HAYSEED



What's brown and sounds like a bell?..... Dung

"In the autumn dung your field, and its bounty it will yield". What's all that 'bout? It's hardly Keats or Byron but if you're interested, read on...

Doug's gardening notes in the last Parish News made for interesting reading and his reference to Percy Thrower brought back memories for me. From an agricultural point

of view, our greatest icon, in those days, was the legendary John Cherrington. He presented Farming News on Sunday afternoons during the 60s and 70s and we never missed it. It was accompanied by the weather forecast too, same as Countryfile is nowadays. Doug would no doubt agree too, that runner beans will grow like mad when they get their roots down onto the good old dark brown stuff and almost any crop is the same.

With most of the corn crops out by now, most of the 'harishes' will get a good coating of dung shortly (or Farm Yard Manure as the experts call it) and this will be ploughed down to help the soil structure. It will also provide some natural fertiliser for the next crop. A good coating of FYM on the grass fields during the autumn and winter period will also help grassland where a lot of nutrients will be drawn up during the dormant period.

Not all 'harishes' get this. An empty corn field is an ideal candidate for a catch crop but time is short. Winter is nearly upon us and the window of opportunity is tight. To get the best out of these catch crops you may need to use a little artificial fertiliser to get them started. All farmers have differing views on this but it needs to be remembered that you can't keep taking things out of the soil without putting something back in!

Catch crops are grazed during the late autumn and winter period and once grazed the field gets a coating of FYM that I've been talking 'bout.

Livestock wise, most of the lambs have been sold fat or as stores by the time you read this and the ewes need to be away from them. Lambing starts in the Spring and as well as having a rest, the ewes need 'flushing', that's another term for some extra food so that they are in good condition for the rams to go in.

With all this FYM, 'flushing' and artificial fertiliser helping keep things in good condition out on the farm, I'm off now to see what's for supper - hopefully something to keep me in good condition too during the autumn days to come.

# This year the Milton Abbot Players are celebrating their 70th anniversary.

It is actually 91 years since Mary Kelly started putting on plays in the village. In the early years the plays were performed in the vicarage barn, above the stables. Later, when the Village Hall was built, the Duke of Bedford had a stage installed to provide a more theatrical venue and he even provided costumes for the more ambitious productions. During the Second World War the group, renamed The Gasbags was unable to put on plays and instead put on variety shows. After the war the Milton Abbot Players were reformed and in 1949 Victor Ward took on the job of producer. His first production was 'Three Half Crowns'. Since then a play has been performed every year in the second week of November.

Traditionally the Players perform comedies and for their 70th anniversary production they have chosen 'Funny Money' written by the master of farce Ray Cooney. The Players can always be relied on to raise a laugh - mostly intentionally - and 'Funny Money' provides an excellent vehicle for this company's flair for comedy.


