A Powerful One-Woman Play

He's on death row. There's a chance of reprieve. And all she can do is wait. She can't understand how her son ended up here, charged with sedition, acts of terrorism, crimes against the state. He was a good boy; she'd brought him up that way, God fearing. And as a man, yes, he was outspoken, yes, he'd recruited followers, yes, some had called him a radical, but this - how could it come to this?

This powerful one-woman play follows the reminiscences of a mother as she contemplates her son's life. The twists and turns, influences and events that have led up to this are portrayed through a unique blend of drama, physical theatre, dance and music. Was there anything she could have done differently, is there anything left to be done, or is time marching on to an inevitable conclusion?

Morag Parker is a music theatre graduate of UCLan, a theatre practitioner and dance teacher. Her company, In The Wings', previous productions include three full-scale musicals including two by its in-house writer Eames Barry, who has also written this drama.

All Saint's Church, Dunterton

We can now confirm that Dunterton Church is open for services.

A massive thank you to everyone, and there were many, who supported a real and passionate wish to keep the church open for services. This has been recognized and is truly amazing!



What was the actual layout of the Last Supper?

Was Leonardo Di Vinci, right? Did Jesus and His disciples sit at a long



table for the Last Supper? While in Jerusalem this year we were shown a room traditionally thought to have been used for the Last Supper. It was square and so suitable for a triclinium or a low Roman styled table surrounded with couches or cushions. People lay on their left side. (Equally there could have been low tables set out in the same format.)

Perhaps there was no long table.

Who sat where? The host of the feast would not sit in the middle but second from the left, (as shown in picture) with the guest of honour on his left

and a trusted friend to his right. The seating then continued around the triclinium, with the most important guests seated on the left, then going around the table, with the least important sitting on the far right. If we look at the Gospels, we find John next to Jesus, probably on his right. *'Now there was leaning on Jesus' chest was one of his disciples, whom Jesus loved.' John 26:23.* Judas



would therefore have to be on His left in order to share a bowl with Our Lord. NATURE NOTES BY BLUEBELL April - May 2023



Behold, the winter is past the rain is over and gone. The flowers appear on the

earth; the time of singing has come, and the voice of the turtle-dove is heard in our land. Song of Solomon 2; 11-12

There is no story in the Bible about the Easter Bunny, but children love hunting for coloured Easter eggs in baskets or nests at Easter tide and there are long traditions associating eggs, rabbits, hares, fluffy little yellow chickens, and lambs with Easter.



The egg is a symbol of vitality, life, new beginnings, Spring, and of the rebirth and resurrection of Christ. The innocent sacrificial lamb is His symbol, too. Bluebell rejoices each year to hear their voices over the hillsides and see them suckling (tails wagging madly) and leaping and bounding in the fields.

The rabbit, likewise, and hares are particularly associated with spring time and fertility. The rabbit particularly is a prolific breeder. Both animals exhibit the phenomenon of superfetation where embryos from different menstrual cycles are present in the uterus, resulting in hares and rabbits being able to give birth seemingly without having been impregnated. This caused them to be seen as symbols of the virgin birth. *Lumpskin, Susan, John Seidensticker 2011; Rabbits, the Animal Answer Guide; JHU Press.*

Hares have a mysterious link with the moon, the dawn, life and fertility, and the Saxon goddess Eostre, whose Spring festival has merged with our Easter. The intriguing, circular motif of the "Three Hares", or the Dartmoor "Tinners Rabbits" can be found locally in Tavistock church, the Chapel at Cotehele, and two in the church at Kelly. They share three ears, yet none has more than two. The three may be a symbol of the Holy Trinity.

Hares are now very scarce here, and the rabbit populations are reduced by myxomatosis and a new virus RHDV 2, which now threatens the brown hare population as well as rabbits. Wild cats are now being reintroduced locally to reduce the number of rabbits. Rabbit numbers fell 43% across the whole of the UK between 2008 and 2018. This is including a decrease in rabbit numbers of 83% in Scotland between 1996-2018. Rabbits, traditionally seen as a pest, are also food, and an ecosystem engineer promoting biodiversity. And a rabbit's foot was supposed to bring luck!

Poor bunny.

GARDEN NOTES BY DOUG

Well, there's a lot to look forward to in the garden. The weather has been up and down like a yoyo but in the end it will steady. Here in mid-March there are already many good signs - the new shoots on the rose stems (have you fed them?), the daffodils, the grass (have you mown it yet? Will you leave it alone in May?), the weeds (have you given them a hoe?). If you haven't already you need to be out there (you've been to the garden centre haven't you?). Get ready.

April is certainly the time to be sowing seed. Doug's making the most of his Purple Sprouting Broccoli and some nice Kale - both sown long ago before filling pots and seed trays in the greenhouse (which could do with a good clean). The tomatoes are looking good (thank you propagator and also for the aubergine seed you started). Now we're off French Beans, Runner Beans, Salad leaves, Courgettes, Carrots, Basil, Parsley, Kale, Beetroot, Nicotianas, Cosmos, Sunflowers, Marigolds, Nasturtiums, and some Annual Meadow seed mix.

For the Annual Meadow I stripped off some turf and turned it over sometime in November. Some of the area was then covered with black fabric -

all to try to kill the grass without resorting to weedkiller. The area is about 5 m2 and it will get given about 20g of seed. The photograph shows what it looks like before the seed got added. Later in the year I'll show you what happened to it. There are different types of 'meadow'. You can have Wild Flower, Perennial Flower mixes or the Annual type. Each requires a bit of different preparation and care. Annual mixes are usually sown in spring and perennial ones in autumn. Perennial ones are better in very infertile soil whereas annuals will like some food.

Until next time, enjoy your garden. Get out there, grow something, feel the reward.






