Questions in Faith

“Is non violent resistance a practical solution to wars in the 21st Century?”

For many years I read the New Testament selectively. Most of us do. Most of it is immediately understandable and directly applicable to our lives. However surely Matthew 5:38-40 doesn't apply to us! “You have heard that it was said, ‘Eye for eye, and tooth for tooth.’ I tell you, do not resist an evil person. If anyone slaps you on the right cheek, turn to the other cheek also. And if anyone wants to sue you and take your shirt, hand over your coat as well”. Equally how can ‘Those who live by the sword will die by the sword.’ (Matt 26:52) possibly relate to us?

However, Jerusalem suffered terribly by ignoring both these teachings and Our Lord's prophecy of its destruction. In 70AD the Jews took on the might of the Roman empire and lost. They not only lost their capital city but their Temple which had been the core of their religion for centuries. It is now a Mosque. By contrast Mahatma Gandhi took on the might of the British Empire non-violently and won. We were as violent and ruthless as any imperial power – but we could not resist Gandhi's campaign of non-violence.

The question arises - could these lessons be applied to the Russian invasion of Ukraine? Ukrainian cities would never have been bombarded, Mariupol would never have been reduced to rubble, tens of thousands of men, women and children would never have been killed or injured and millions of people would never have been displaced.

The only certainty in the current situation is that sooner or later Putin will leave office or die. The emperor Titus died, the Romans left Jerusalem and the Roman empire ultimately turned into the Holy Roman empire. Equally the current evil expansionist Russian regime will fall and be replaced by a more moderate one interested in restoring commercial and diplomatic relations with the world – speeded on by crippling sanctions and international isolation.



Over the years I have grown to read, believe and take literally everything our Lord said – even the difficult things. Could it be that future 'wars' will take the form of non-violent but crippling sanctions combined with global political and cultural isolation? Non-violent resistance historically appears to be unstoppable. Could it be that non-violence comes of age in the 21st Century and that this Ukrainian war is the war that ends all wars?

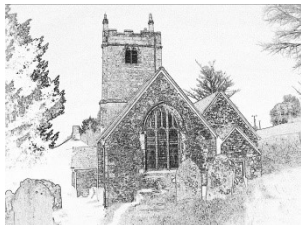

The Children's Society is a national charity working to transform the hopes and happiness of young people facing abuse, neglect, and exploitation. We support them through their most serious life challenges, and we campaign tirelessly for the big social changes that will improve the lives of those who need hope most. We've been doing this for 140 years and we won't stop until we've built a society where hope is alive in every child.

From our research, we know that 3 in 10 children are currently living in poverty*, 1 in 6 children are likely to have a mental health condition, 4,000 teenagers are being criminally exploited in London alone and 144 children go missing or run away each day in the UK. Enough is enough. Society has failed children for too long.

As a charity, we run 81 direct services and 6 national programmes. We worked with 11,513 young people last year and 84% of them said their lives improved after working with us. In 2021, after 7 years of campaigning, we changed the law to make sure that there is a price cap on all school uniforms. This will positively impact over 8 million children across the country.

In the South-West, we have a Prevention Programme that works with professionals and the public to help them spot the signs of child exploitation. We also have Checkpoint, a service based in Torbay that has been working directly with children and young people for over 20 years across Devon and also our National Young Carers program based in Colden Common, Hampshire, who run the country's only young carers festival.

Our goal: By 2030 we will have overturned the damaging decline in children's well-being, setting a path for long lasting growth.

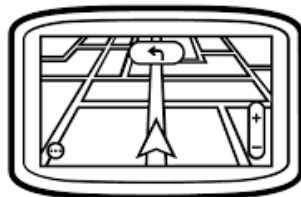

A CHILD'S FOOTSTEPS TO FAITH

Our Spiritual GPS

Do you know what a GPS is? GPS stands for Global Positioning System. Many of us have a GPS in our car or on our smartphone. When we want to go somewhere, we put the address of the place where we would like to go into our GPS, and it will give us turn-by-turn directions and puts a picture on the screen showing us how to get there.



How does it do that? Well, first of all, the GPS device must have a map installed of the area where we are located. Then it connects to satellites orbiting the earth and the satellites send back information to the GPS which shows the directions on the screen.

But wait, there is even more. The GPS will help us find our way — even if we get lost. If we make a wrong turn, the GPS will adjust the directions to get us back on the right track. It tells us how fast we are going, how far it is to our destination, and what time we will arrive!

In trying to find our way through life's journeys, God has given us a spiritual GPS to guide us. That guide is the Holy Spirit. When we don't know what to do or which way to turn, the Holy Spirit always points us in the right direction. Do you remember that the GPS needs a map to be able to show us the way? Well, that is true of our spiritual GPS as well. The map we must follow in our daily life is the Bible. It is the map that shows us how to live life in a way that is pure and good.



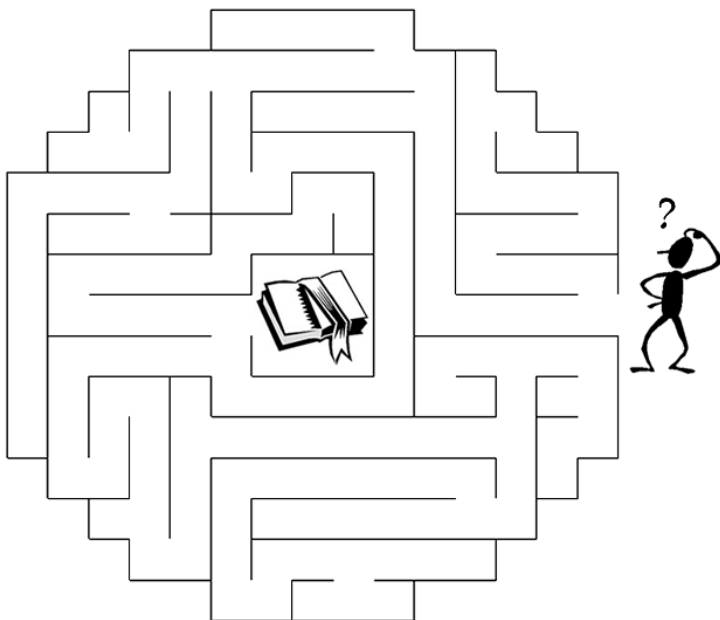
Some people rely on their feelings to help them make decisions. That's no good. Our feelings may change from day-to-day, so they cannot be trusted to guide us in the right direction. Some people look at what others are doing to help them make important decisions. That is no good either. Just because everyone else is doing it doesn't mean that it is the right thing to do.

Jesus knew that we needed help in making the right decisions in life. He promised that God would send the Holy Spirit "to guide us in all truth." That means that the Holy Spirit will help us to understand God's Word which always points us in the right direction. It points us to Jesus who is "the Way, the Truth, and the Life."

I can't imagine taking a trip without a GPS to help me find the way — and I can't imagine trying to navigate life's journey without the Holy Spirit to guide me. Whenever I don't know which way to turn, I can always turn to God's Word and let the Holy Spirit be my guide.

Heavenly Father, we are thankful that when our Lord Jesus went away, he sent the Holy Spirit to be our helper, our teacher, and our guide in our daily journey. Help us to follow his guidance. In Jesus' name we pray. Amen.

NATURE NOTES BY BLUEBELL



“Brightness falls from the air;
Queens have died young and fair;”

Thomas Nashe, 1567-1601: In Time of Pestilence

But indeed our Queen did not die young. Her Majesty has been, thank Our Lord, spared, honoured and loved, to serve and reign in our fair and pleasant land for seventy years, to celebrate her Platinum Jubilee in spite of our 21st century time of pestilence.

Though Nashe meant that darkness fell, Bluebell has always loved his line, “Brightness falls from the air”, as every Spring she has watched millions of bright petals gently drift down from the air to the grass, from flowering trees, caught in sunlight, in woods and meadows, parks, gardens and orchards. They often lie in a white or pink pool at the foot of apple trees and cherry trees, like a reflection.

The song thrush in Bluebell’s garden has a nest in a wild rose bush. The blue eggs have hatched.

The swifts are back! The first few on the 10th May. Bluebell heard them screaming round the house. Joy! “They’ve made it again, Which means the globe’s still working, the Creation’s Still waking refreshed...” *Ted Hughes*.

But there are very few swallows. “Without these birds’ glistening blue backs and red throats, wouldn’t even the sunniest days seem drab? And if their beloved twittering falls silent across the nation’s telephone wires, then the long, light-filled days will feel empty. Should their dancing flightbe banished, an inestimable grace will have departed these shores.due to habitat destruction and pesticide use, every year fewer swallows return. Isn’t it time to finally turn the tide? *Jonathan Tulloch The Times May 12 2022.*

The lanes and hedgerows are lined with the white starry flowers of greater stitchwort and mile upon mile of delicate white Cow Parsley, also known as Queen Anne’s Lace. Buttercups and dandelions, bluebells, early purple orchids and pink campion, with shuttlecock ferns make a glorious coloured tapestry.

Queen Anne’s lace belongs to the carrot family. Many of its members are edible, carrots, chervil, sweet cicely, coriander, angelica, ground elder, dill, and alexanders for example. But some are dangerously poisonous, such as hemlock, which killed Socrates, and water dropwort. Giant hogweed has a sap that burns.



GARDEN NOTES BY DOUG



Sing along: "We're all going on a summer holiday, no more working for a week or two!" Well, welcome to the sunshine, an *occasional* shower, and a garden bursting with colour and delight. Almost?

Spring has been great - the tulips stunning and some lovely colour from wallflowers and forget-me-nots. The latter seem to do their own gardening and are really quite expert. They blow around, choose some spots, analyse the soil and the aspect, sow themselves and wait. They've looked lovely for weeks and are now ready to do it all again next spring. If you don't want them where they are next year, you're too late. They've been careful to not draw attention to their seed. With some plants you see the flower then the seed head comes later. Think of sunflowers. The bright yellow flower with the dark centre which then becomes the seed head when the flower has lost its colour. The seeds are all together, packed in a disc. With the forget-me-nots the seeds are strung out along the flower stem. A very successful but quite different arrangement. The more you look at plants the more you realise how many different ideas they have.

If you're quick, you can grow some sunflowers. Get some sunflower seed. Doug recommends American Giant, F1. Sow in some 4 inch pots of compost - maybe on a warm windowsill. Plant out into soil where you've added lots of compost and organic stuff. Give 'em some liquid feed as they grow. You'll be impressed, but children, grandchildren and neighbours will be even more impressed. American Giant can reach 5m if conditions are right! Once the flower is over, the birds will come, raid the seed head and be delighted.

Time for Dahlias - out in beds or in pots. So many varieties now; colours, shapes. I hope you've got some sweet peas? They should be climbing up their poles. Nothing compares with the lovely fragrance of a bunch in the house. With luck you'll be wondering what to do with your excess tomato plants. Give 'em away!

July - maybe think about hardy plants for next spring. Sow some wallflower seed in trays outside, prick 'em out, pot 'em on. The more, the merrier. Plant out in autumn where you want them to show off. They really can make a stunning display, even if they are out of fashion, and need very little effort; unlike some things we could mention.

FARMING LIFE, BY HAYSEED

Out Standing In His Field



"No Rain in May, Light Crop of Hay!"

I am a great one for old country sayings and that one always seems to ring true. As I write this we haven't had any heavy rain for some time but it's amazing how the grass etc. seems to be growing. Many of the early boys will be cutting their first crop of silage now and there seems to be some good crops around. Grassland management today has to be of the highest efficiency and you just can't beat that first cut.

Most of the beef cows have calved and together with the bulling heifers are now out to grass making the work load just that little bit easier with very few frosts and cold nights recently. Still a few new born calves in by night with their Mums though.

In 12 weeks time the cows and heifers will have to run with their "Boy friend" so that they can all get in calf. The cows pregnancy period is 9 months, so next year they will all be expecting again God willing!!

It is lovely to see so many ewes and lambs out in the fields now with many of the lambs that were born early in the year growing away well. It is essential that ewes have plenty to eat and drink at this time of year to keep the lambs fed with plenty of milk.

Autumn cereals are now growing well but in all fairness, the seeds have been, in many instances, in the soil for 6 months!!! The spring sown cereals were drilled in early April and although getting established now all could do with a nice shower of warm rain.

The past week has seen quite an acreage of maize drilled in the area, mostly put under plastic sheeting to keep the late frost at bay.

All in all, May is a lovely month of the year and so far it has been very pleasant - fingers crossed for some showers of rain at times to bring on the grass and crops for a good harvest.

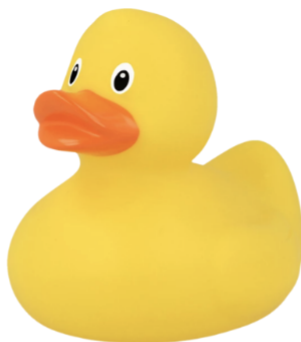

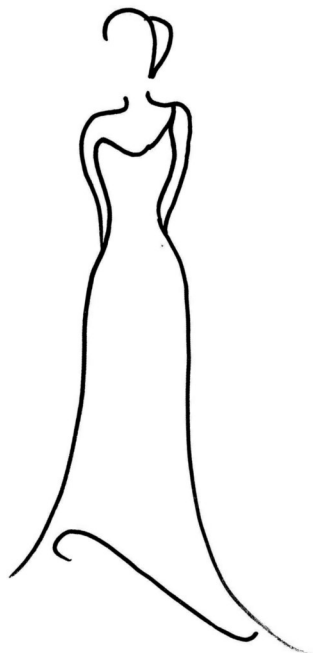
