

Dear Friends,

So many times, when we are reading the Bible, we find much about Jesus which is counter-cultural.

His teachings, like the Sermon on the Mount, seem to turn the world view upside down.

We have a prime example on Palm Sunday – the Son of God, the Messiah, enters Jerusalem to bring about the promised salvation of God's people, and rides in on – a lowly donkey.

Compare Jesus' actions to those of world leaders today, particularly those who appear to think they are the great saviour of their people – how different, how humble, is Christ?

The whole of our Easter story is one of God doing things His way and not the world's way.

As Jesus hangs upon the cross, the soldiers and onlookers mock Him, saying that if He were the Son of God, then why doesn't He just come down.

They don't understand, that rather than saving himself, Jesus is interested only in saving each one of us, even though we are totally undeserving. That Christ should choose to die to bring about our redemption is so contrary to anyone's expectation of what the Messiah would do when He came.

As we round off this period of Lent, and journey through Easter, can I encourage you to look for God's way, and ask if we need to stop going our own way if it doesn't follow the way of Christ.

Where do we need to be brave, or even appear foolish, in shrugging off the expectations of the world, and instead walk the counter-cultural path that bears witness to God's grace and love?

There will be plenty of opportunities within our mission community to experience the Easter story and track the way of Christ.

We have services and events throughout Holy Week, like the Stations of the Cross, Maundy Thursday, a Walk of Witness, and an Easter Eve service, all rounded off with five services on Easter Day, starting from sunrise.

I do hope you will join us for these very special services.

Bishop of Exeter's 5 strategic priorities

As Bishop Mike settles into his new role as Bishop of Exeter, he brings fresh eyes on our Diocesan vision of Growing in Prayer, Making New Disciples and Serving the People of Devon with Joy.

In the outworking of the vision, Bishop Mike identifies five strategic priorities:

"First, **missional leadership**: equipping and resourcing the ordained and lay leaders of our Christian communities as best as we can to develop disciples and make new disciples.

Second, developing a "missional DNA" across our Christian communities, encouraging outward-looking, invitational churches, hospitable to outsiders and engaged with their wider communities.

Third, cultivating an intentional **vocational culture** so that we are not asking whether God is calling me/us, but "To what is God calling me/us now?" Fourth, **children and young people** being placed at the heart of our life, mission and ministry.

And fifth, a **mixed ecology**: understanding that we need different ways of doing and being Church.

Alongside time-honoured Church we need all sorts of Christian communities which can engage with the 95% of our population who are as yet unengaged.

I hope that these five priorities will become embedded at every level of our ministry going forward."

In response to this, Bishop Mike has asked us all to be regularly praying this prayer:


God of mission

A CHILD'S FOOTSTEPS TO FAITH

The Case of the Empty Tomb

Do you like mystery stories? On Easter Sunday we are going to hear the most exciting mystery story ever told. I call it "The Case of the Empty Tomb."

The story begins very early in the morning on the first day of the week. Jesus had just been crucified and buried. Mary Magdalene, one of Jesus' followers, went to the tomb where Jesus was buried. 



NATURE NOTES BY BLUEBELL

The year's at the spring And day's at the morn; Morning's at seven; the hill-side's dew-pearled; The lark's on the wing; The snail's on the thorn: God's in his heaven -



All is not right, of course, neither in Browning's drama, nor in the world today, with war and global warming threatening. But somehow when the light returns in spring, with the daffodils and swallows and celandines and chiff chaffs (the feathered metronome); still, hope and innocence return, with the forgiveness of Easter and the sweet cry of the lambs in our fields.

When daffodils begin to peer, With heigh! The doxy over the dale,



Daffodils come in a rich diversity of flower forms, and are native to the mountain or hilly pastures of Central and Southern Europe. One of the loveliest is Narcissus poeticus, which is often crossed with our native daffodil N. pseudonarcissus, (pale lemon flowers and long trumpets) which is the one that delighted Wordsworth, when he saw all at once a crowd, A host of golden daffodils; Beside the lake, beneath the trees, Fluttering and dancing in the breeze. Narcissus poeticus or the Poet's daffodil is also called the pheasant's eye daffodil. It is late season, intensely fragrant, with white petal-like tepals and a flattened yellow, frilly cup with a striking red edge. There are hundreds of cultivars of daffodils; many can be seen in specialist gardens in the Tamar Valley today.

The new railway link in the 19th Century brought daffodils from the Tamar Valley to London and other cities. Ten thousand people were employed to pick the daffodils.

They were laid in blue tissue lined boxes to be sent to Covent Garden. The Tamar Double White, a late season, beautiful, fragrant flower was very special. In the Second World War food crops supplanted the daffodils in the Tamar Valley, but many of the uprooted bulbs still grow in the hedgerows and wood edges.

In her nest, hidden in the potting shed, Bluebell has observed a hen blackbird, turning regularly round to keep her eggs evenly warm.

It has been suggested that painting one or all wings of wind turbines black would reduce the number of wild birds killed by

them. 10,000 to 100,000 are estimated to be killed by them annually, but about 55 million birds are estimated to be killed by domestic cats. (Letters, Times March 1 2025). Another killer to be wary of is the polecat, returning to our area, and wild boar, recently encountered on Dartmoor near Meldon and near Poundsgate, Ashburton.

COULD THIS BE YOU?


At the recent meeting of the Benefice Pastoral Care Team on the 24th June, it was agreed that we should run a locally based Anna Friends Training Course in October. With Rev. Andy leaving and Rev. Phill holding the fort with support from Tim Thompson and Richard Searight, there was a recognition that many of our older folk, who can longer physically attend our church services, should be supported as much as possible by our local lay people. Anna Friends work alongside Anna Chaplains (Annie Jefferies and Josie Whitfield) to offer varying degrees of spiritual support. This might be personal visits to people's home, telephone support or taking worship services in care homes.

All six of our churches have parishioners in their later years and when falls or illness make people housebound, we should have a flexible team who can visit these people at home. It would therefore be ideal to have one or two people from each church who might consider doing the Anna Friends course which is done over three training sessions of two hours each.

The course will cover:-

- what it means to be a good and focused listener
- the ageing process, grief and loss
- what is dementia and how can we meaningfully engage with individuals and their families
- how to select helpful Bible readings
- writing simple prayers
- offering people Holy Communion at home

GARDEN NOTES BY DOUG

Well, here in March, enjoying the warm, dry, sunny weather I wonder what it will be like when you read this in April?

This nice weather has been helpful in reducing the slug invasions we had last year. I just hope it continues or I'll be out at night with a torch hunting and collecting!

Sometimes you can get things wrong when gardening. We all do at some stage. The right plant in the wrong place; the wrong plant in the right place. Too big, too small, the wrong colour, not enough sun, too much shade.



A mistake I've made recently is using wood ash from the wood burner around rhododendrons and all over the garden.

Wood ash does contain some useful nutrients but it can easily turn slightly acidic soil alkaline and we do have slightly acidic soil here in our garden. Rhododendrons like slightly acid soil, as do some other plants - heathers, camellias and blueberries, for example.

To know where you are and what to do, you need to measure the pH of your soil; and then you can get involved in the chemistry.

As if there wasn't enough to do in the garden this time of year!

Perhaps I will get round to measuring the pH again;

I have got a meter.

Then I can decide where to put that wood ash too!

It is time for sowing seed. Vegetables and flowers. Inside and out.

My early tomato seeds are on a sunny windowsill upstairs. They may be a little early but by the time you read this they should be sticking themselves up and asking where the greenhouse is.

If they don't appear I have some spares just in case.

Primula and crocus have done very well this March so perhaps, we have lots of flowers to look forward to? The daffodils are bursting into flower as I write so 'fingers crossed' for a good spring and summer.

So, let's get going! Or - sow, let's get going!






