#### **Questions in Faith**

## Do we suffer for our sins? Is there a link between sin and disease, disability or injury?

Several times in the Bible and particularly in the New Testament we are told that disease or disability are a consequence of sin. For instance, in John 5:1-15 we hear of our Lord in Jerusalem meeting a paralyzed man that he had healed the previous day. He said something very significant to him. "See, you are well again. Stop sinning or something worse may happen to you." These words do not sound like the slip of the tongue -



especially when in Mark 2:1-12 Jesus heals and forgives the sins of another paralyzed man who was lowered through the roof of a building that he was teaching in. Jesus cures him by saying, "Son, your sins are forgiven."

The Pharisees' objection to Jesus's healing of the man through the forgiveness of his sins was because this was something only God could do - and so a blasphemous act punishable by death. Mark 2:1-12 records that the Pharisees thought, "Why does this fellow talk like that? He's blaspheming! Who can forgive sins but God alone?" Immediately Jesus knew in his spirit that this was what they were thinking in their hearts, and he said to them, "Why are you thinking these things? Which is easier: to say to this paralyzed man, 'Your sins are forgiven,' or to say, 'Get up, take your mat and walk'?" This is story is also recorded in (Luke 5:21 and Matthew 9:1-8)

The belief in the link between sin and its potentially physical consequences is one common to most major religious traditions. The rejection of this belief in most current Christian theology does not appear to have any specific biblical basis. In fact, our non-acceptance of this principle creates all sorts of theological problems — especially in relation to equity, justice and injustice. For instance, if there is a just God, why should some people enjoy perfect health while others suffer ill health? Where is the justice in this? Perhaps it is time we thought again? Perhaps there really are physical consequences for our actions - after all Our Lord also said "Those who live by the sword will die by the sword'. (Matthew 26:52.) St Paul followed this by declaring that '...whatever a man sows, this he will also reap'. (Galatians 6:7). Perhaps the jury should be out!

#### Dear Friends.

Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II had been Sovereign of this country for the whole of my life. She was kind, steadfast and prayerful with a lifelong commitment to public service. She clearly understood the role of the Monarchy to be one of service and being solely about the wellbeing of her people. I have watched the television this week, seeing an outpouring of grief and mourning, from people not only across the UK, but across the world.

The coronation ceremony of Queen Elizabeth II took place in 1953 and is based historically on the medieval Consecration (Ordination) ceremony of a Bishop. New Monarchs are given a mandate to Christian service. Her Majesty utterly understood her own calling, which she lived out, day by day, with genuine love and compassion. During the 70 years in which she reigned, she exemplified selfless service to others, encouraging others to love and to serve their neighbour.

On Saturday the 11<sup>th</sup> of September our Curate Phillip Parker was Ordained to the Diaconate. I could not help but see the similarities in the calling to which Phill has been called and to her Majesties own lifelong calling to serve others. This calling to serve others, this "Golden Thread" of service, flows from Christ to this very day through Her Majesty and now Phill

In Phill's Ordination service he is called to:

Deacons are called to work with the Bishop and the priests with whom they serve as heralds of Christ's kingdom. They are to proclaim the Gospel in word and deed ..... They are to serve the community in which they are set .... They are to work with their fellow members in searching out the poor and weak, the sick and lonely and those who are oppressed and powerless, reaching into the forgotten corners of the world, that the love of God may be made visible.. They are to be faithful in prayer, expectant and watchful for the signs of God's presence, as he reveals his kingdom among us

May I ask you all to pray for the Royal family, who have lost a much-loved mother and grandmother. Also, to Pray for Phill and Morag as they continue to settle within our Benefice. May I finally ask you all to pray for our new King.





One day, Jesus was walking through a small village when He saw a group of ten lepers. They stood far away from Jesus and called to Him, "Jesus, Master, have pity on us." Obviously, they knew who Jesus was and that He had the power to heal them. When Jesus heard them, He called back to the lepers and said, "Go, show yourself to the priest."

As the lepers went on their way to see the priest, they looked at their skin and the sores were gone. Jesus had healed their disease. They were so happy that they ran up and down the streets singing and dancing. Suddenly, one of them stopped and went back. Praising God with a loud voice, he threw himself at Jesus' feet and said, "Thank You."

## A Story on the Theme of Compassion The Kindness of A Stranger

It was a bitter, cold evening in northern Virginia many years ago. The old man's beard was glazed by winter's frost while he waited for a ride across the river. The wait seemed endless. His body became numb and stiff from the frigid north wind.

He heard the faint, steady rhythm of approaching hooves galloping along the frozen path. Anxiously, he watched as several horsemen rounded the bend. He let the first one pass by without an effort to get his attention. Then another passed by, and another. Finally, the last rider neared the spot where the old man sat like a snow statue. As this one drew near, the old man caught the rider's eye and said, "Sir, would you mind giving an old man a ride to the other side? There doesn't appear to be a passageway by foot."

Reining his horse, the rider replied, "Sure thing. Hop aboard." Seeing the old man was unable to lift his half-frozen body from the ground, the horseman dismounted and helped the old man onto the horse. The horseman took the old man not just across the river, but to his destination, which was just a few miles away.

As they neared the tiny cottage, the horseman's curiosity made him ask, "Sir, I notice that you let several other riders pass by without making an effort to secure a ride. Then I came up and you immediately asked me for a ride. I'm curious why, on such a bitter winter night, you would wait and ask the last rider. What if I had refused and left you there?"

The old man slowly came down from the horse, looked the rider straight in the eyes, and replied, "I've been around for a long time. I reckon I know people pretty well." The old man continued, "I looked into the eyes of the other riders and immediately saw there was no concern for my situation. It would have been useless even to ask them for a ride. But when I looked into your eyes, kindness and compassion were evident. I knew, then and there, that your gentle spirit would welcome the opportunity to give me assistance in my time of need."

Those heart-warming comments touched the horseman deeply. "I'm most grateful for what you have said," he told the old man. "May I never get too busy in my own affairs that I fail to respond to the needs of others with kindness and compassion."

Legend has it that then, Thomas Jefferson, the third president of the United States, turned his horse around and made his way back to the White House.

With all the nation Bluebell is mourning the Queen, Elizabeth II, and praying for our new King, Charles III, and all the Royal family.

The clerodendron, with its white starry flowers, and sweet scent, autumn flowering, to be followed by its startling smooth jewel-like blue berry, is a small tree in Bluebell's garden. Bluebell will always now associate it with the state funeral of the Queen. It reminds her of the jewelled crown with its ancient blue sapphire on her coffin. It could be one of the "Flowers of the Forest", the Scottish lament played so mournfully by the piper at Balmoral for her Majesty.

The autumn has been wonderful for mushrooms this year. And apples, the trees are weighted down with abundance. Soon the evenings will darken, bird migrations will fill the skies, and the season of All Souls and All Saints will arrive.

Among her many achievements and in her legacy for Nature is, acting on Frank Field's (a Labour MP's) original idea, the creation of The Queen's Commonwealth Canopy. The QCC initiative, set up in 2015, and supported by most of the Commonwealth countries, the young Royals, and David Attenborough, is a global network of protected rain forests, across the Commonwealth. The hope and aim is for changing the future and protecting the earth, trees and the wildlife within the forests. In 2019, 46 Commonwealth countries around the world had signed up.

Also, because of her love of trees and the countryside, in 2022, this year of her Platinum Jubilee, The Queen's Green Canopy was set up to plant more trees and protect ancient forests in The United Kingdom. Free trees are available from the Woodland Trust. Many will be planted this winter.

#### **GARDEN NOTES BY DOUG**



Well, it's been quite a year weather-wise in the garden, but it has been good for many flowers and for some vegetables too. My tomatoes, in tubs outside, have been prolific; more so than those in the greenhouse. This is *Montello F1* - sow it, pot it, water and feed. No fuss, no bother. Lots of tasty plumb toms!

If you're looking for some weeds to grow in your garden (well, lots of folk <u>do</u> grow weeds, just look around) these two are very popular. Bittercress and Yellow Sorrel/Oxalis. Both have a brilliant way to please and astonish the kids. When the seed heads are ripe, (you need to look carefully with your glasses on) just a gentle touch



Bittercress is a good choice because it is easy to pull up; the roots are very shallow. The other one has spreading roots which are very difficult to extract 100%. Your choice. Enjoy.

"It Rains in West Devon Six Days in Sevon!"

That old saying was made by a monarch that visited Tavistock some four centuries ago. Funnily enough it is raining streams as I am writing this article but as farmers we have witnessed one of the driest summers ever!!

My previous report a couple of months ago said that crops were looking good but all would benefit from a drink. Our part of West Devon has faired better than most but the temperature was so high on some days that it certainly affected those crops. Harvesting of the Winter corn went well generally with some excellent yields and samples recorded, however for many it was a different story for the Spring corn. This crop was sown in late spring and took a lot of "getting going" and when it came to harvest, the yields and amounts of straw in some cases were lower than we would have all liked.

Early Silage and hay crops yielded well and were mostly of excellent quality. Some were able to get second cut silage with a few managing a third cut but August was a very dry and hot month when the grass literally stopped growing. 4th September saw the first sizeable amount of rain and we are all hopeful that perhaps the grass fields will recover sufficiently to allow us perhaps another cut of silage before the autumn really sets in.

Talking of quality, the next crop to harvest has to have rain! Maize has grown on well lately, it is not so much the height of the stalks it is the size and quality of the corn cob it produces that matters. We shall have to see how the crop turns out this year when harvesting soon begins.

The cattle have grown well considering the really hot days and lack of grass in August. It is quite frightening to see how much water they drink. Dairy cows drink more that you would ever imagine. Statistics show that a 15 cwt cow drinks 30 gallons a day just for maintenance with another 2 gallons a day for every gallon of milk she produces!

This year more silage has been fed in the summer to supplement the lack of grass, so fingers crossed that we will have enough to see us all through the long winter and spring. Grass is a very precious commodity that I am afraid we sometimes take for granted.

To quote an old country saying. "You can't do 'Nort' about the weather!

#### The Potluck Book Club - A Year in Review

The first year of the Potluck Book Club has now ended and what an interesting literary journey it's been. It started with 'The Inheritance', the story of a priceless family heirloom which holds

the key to captivating secret stories told across three generations. Next came 'The Blasphemer' which sweeps from the trenches of the First World War to the terror-infested streets of London, a story of conditional love, cowardice and the possibility of redemption.

Then it was off to the Victorian London for 'Sweet Thames', the story of an engineer's quest to find the source of a cholera outbreak. The quest shatters his ideals and strikes at everything he holds dear. This was followed by 'The Seventh Cross', a tale set during WW II, about a manhunt but which is also a portrayal of the perils of ordinary life in Hitler's Germany.

For the next selection, I switched continents as I read 'A Princess Remembers' covering life in India in the 20<sup>th</sup> Century from the point of view of the Maharani of Jaipur. Then it was back to Georgian London via Jamaica for 'The Confessions of Frannie Loughton' and the story of the trial of a maid accused of murdering her employers.

The next selection was a wonderful tale of murder and skull-duggery in Tudor England. I can't wait to read the second book in this five-part (so far!) series. Then came 'Invisible Cities', a beautifully poetic imagining of how Marco Polo might have described to Kublai Khan the many cities he visited.

'The Betrayals' poses the question: 'If your whole life was based on a lie, would you risk it all to tell the truth?' It is a story of choices made against a backdrop of Fascism and its ideas. The last selection, 'The Dare', was an electrifying novel of suspense which I finished in one afternoon as I found it was impossible to wait for the next twist in the plot.

The Book Club is organised by Marystowe's Joy McSmythurs. A £10 subscription buys 12 books, all delivered free of charge. Potluck does mean that it is possible that a subscriber has read one or more of the selections as happened twice in my case. I highly recommend the Potluck Book Club and I can't wait for my second year's selections to arrive!

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
