A CHILD'S FOOTSTEPS TO FAITH

No, I imagine that you probably searched until you found what you had lost. In our Bible lesson today, Jesus tells two stories about people who have lost something very important to them.

The first story Jesus told was about a man who had a hundred sheep. One of his sheep strayed away from the flock and became lost. Every one of the man's sheep was important to him, so he left the ninety-nine and went to search for the one lost sheep. When he found it, he was so happy that he called all of his friends together and said, "Rejoice with me; I have found my lost sheep."





Next, Jesus told a story about a woman who had ten silver coins. Each of the coins was worth a day's wages. The woman counted her coins, "One, two, three, four, five, six, seven, eight, nine. Oh no! I have lost one of my coins," she cried. Do you know what she did? She turned on every light in the house, swept the floor, and searched until she found the one lost coin. When she found the lost coin, she called all of her friends and neighbours together and said, "Rejoice with me; I have found my lost coin."

Jesus told these two stories to demonstrate God's love for us. We are God's children, but sometimes we get lost. When that happens, God doesn't give up on us. He searches for us and he won't stop until we are found. In fact, the Bible tells us that God sent his son, Jesus, to seek and save the lost. And just as the people in the story rejoiced when they found what was lost, Jesus said, "There is rejoicing in the presence of the angels of God over one sinner who repents." I'm glad that God loves us so much that he doesn't give up on us when we get lost, aren't you?


Father, we are your children and you love each and every one of us. We are thankful that you don't give up on us when we get lost. In Jesus' name we pray. Amen.

NATURE NOTES BY BLUEBELL

August – September 2025

"I kept him for his humor's sake,

For he would oft beguile

My heart of thoughts that made it ache,

And force me to a smile." William Cowper, 'Epitaph on a Hare', 1783

quoted by Chloe Dalton, in 'Raising Hare' her enchanting story of finding a little leveret on a field track near her home in the country and rearing it during the Covid Pandemic.

William Cowper kept some hares for companion animals, but this is very rare, bunny rabbits are much more usual as pets.

Lepus capensis, the brown hare, and oryctolagus cunniculus, the rabbit, are very different animals. So far, in July, it has been a good year for rabbits and there are a lot about, to the dismay of gardeners. Bluebell loves watching them. Rabbit babies are born blind and hairless, and need the protection, of the warren, or burrow, which may be several feet deep and with a maze of passages. Rabbits seldom go far from the burrow, and a nibbled fringe of soft grass can be seen about ten feet wide along the edge of the field whose hedges hide their bolt holes to safety.

The leveret, or baby brown hare, is born with its eyes open, fully covered with fur, including the pads of its paws, (unlike a dog or cat) in a shallow impression in open ground, called a form. It stays completely still for hours while its mother leaves to feed. The adult hare can run about 40mph, usually in a huge circle, and has a slow, unbalanced lolloping gait as well. It is about twice the size of a rabbit. They are shot, and hunted by hounds, for sport and eating. At Sydenham in 1906-1907 a shoot record shows 23 hares and 118 rabbits, and 411 rabbits shot at Coryton. There is no close season for hares in England and Wales. Baroness Helic and Baroness Hayman are trying to correct this in Parliament. The numbers of hares have dropped about 80% in the last hundred years. They are rarely seen now.

But they are one of the most evocative symbols of the English countryside: the moon-gazing hare, mad March hares boxing, the tinners' rabbits or hares, are well loved images. There is something mythical, elusive, almost mystical about a hare. It is associated with witches, and Spring, Eostre (the Goddess of Easter), fertility and Resurrection, the Moon and the Mad Hatter's tea party. In the winter sky of the Northern hemisphere, crouched near the feet of Orion, the Hunter, and his dog Sirius in Canis Major, is the constellation of the hare, Lepus.

The tinners's hares symbol is three hares chasing each other in a circle sharing three ears yet every animal has two ears, in a riddling geometric daisy wheel image. It may symbolise the Holy Trinity. Locally, there is one in a boss in St Eustachius's Tavistock, in Cotehele chapel, in the Castle Inn at Lydford, and two in the church at Kelly.





GARDEN NOTES BY DOUG



You do learn things when gardening. You have to remember to not forget them the following year, but not to believe everything anybody else tells you. One thing it's

taken me years to learn is do <u>not</u> plant perennials in a square pot. There are some very nice square pots out there in garden centres but if you put, say, a rose, or a bay tree, or some lovely shrub in a square pot you'll never get it out without a lot of trouble. Time will come when you need to repot it, or plant it out, because it's grown too big *smash up the pot, mate.* One way you can avoid this is to find a round plastic pot which just fits inside the square pot, maybe propped up by an upturned pot. Then, if you need to repot, it's easy peasy.

Another thing is watering peat free compost. We all buy peat free now and it is the best option, but it can be awkward to know just when to water it when you've sown seeds or potted on some fragile little seedlings. The top can look very, very dry when the bulk below is soaking wet. You water it and then the seedlings die away because they're too wet. I usually judge the weight of the pot, or tray, then water, or not. Others say *stick your finger down the side and feel its moisture*.



We've got a fig tree which was planted years ago. Each year it has produced tiny fruits but none worth harvesting. This year - don't mention the weather - it has a lot of quite big fruits. They're not ripe yet, but maybe if we have another hot spell we will have something worth eating?

Meanwhile, the tomatoes are coming on. Yum! Think bulbs to plant in the autumn daffodils, tulips, camassias? Enjoy your garden and the weather

whenever you can.



COULD THIS BE YOU?


At the recent meeting of the Benefice Pastoral Care Team on the 24th June, it was agreed that we should run a locally based Anna Friends Training Course in October. With Rev. Andy leaving and Rev. Phill holding the fort with support from Tim Thompson and Richard Searight, there was a recognition that many of our older folk, who can longer physically attend our church services, should be supported as much as possible by our local lay people. Anna Friends work alongside Anna Chaplains (Annie Jefferies and Josie Whitfield) to offer varying degrees of spiritual support. This might be personal visits to people's home, telephone support or taking worship services in care homes.

All six of our churches have parishioners in their later years and when falls or illness make people housebound, we should have a flexible team who can visit these people at home. It would therefore be ideal to have one or two people from each church who might consider doing the Anna Friends course which is done over three training sessions of two hours each.

The course will cover:-

- what it means to be a good and focused listener
- the ageing process , grief and loss
- what is dementia and how can we meaningfully engage with individuals and their families
- how to select helpful Bible readings
- writing simple prayers
- offering people Holy Communion at home

The course will run in October, dates to be agreed depending on what is convenient to those wishing to attend. For more details contact Annie (614178) or Josie (07989 666427).








